"Capturing Life" (1839-1869)

A one-hour documentary about our region's remarkable photographic heritage

Three public screenings scheduled during the FotoFocus Biennial in October

Greater Cincinnati was a major center for the development of early American photography. The region's remarkable photographic history is revealed in "Capturing Life" (1839-1869), a one-hour documentary to be shown in three, free public screenings during the FotoFocus Biennial in October. "Capturing Life" (1839-1869) examines the social, economic and cultural impact of photography as our region rose from modest river towns into a commercial powerhouse in America's heartland.



"Capturing Life" (1839-1869) is the first episode in *The Big Picture: A History of Photography in Greater Cincinnati*, a documentary series being produced by the nonprofit organization Voyageur Media Group, Inc. "Capturing Life" (1839-1869) features the remarkable careers of American photographic pioneers, including: Dr. John Locke, a chemistry professor who created the first photographs (photogenic drawings) ever displayed in America; Ezekiel Hawkins, a sign painter who established the region's first daguerreotype studio in

1841; James P. Ball, an African-American entrepreneur who not only owned one of the nation's most successful daguerreotype studios, but also served as a leader in the abolitionist movement; Charles Fontayne and William Porter, whose eight-plate panorama, *Daguerreotype View of Cincinnati*, 1848, is the oldest comprehensive photograph of a city in North America; and Charles Waldack who used magnesium light to make the first photographs of a cave system in America at Mammoth Cave in 1866.

"Capturing Life" (1839-1869) combines interviews with rare archival photographs, original artworks and 4k video for a compelling look at our region's rich photographic heritage. The documentary explores the impact of photography on such historical events as immigration, western expansion, the abolitionist movement, the Underground Railroad, the Civil War, and post-war industrialization.
